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
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#### A word from the president

As a nurse, I can tell you that this technology is simply awesome and it will significantly improve the care we provide patients in our own ICU.

Telemedicine and collaborations are the future of healthcare. It is how the medical community will respond to the growing need for increasingly advanced services even in rural settings such as Lewistown.

Finally, I want need to recognize a group that provides so much value and important work that furthers the mission of Lewistown Hospital, our volunteers. Our volunteers really are the silent backbone of our Hospital. Without the work that they do so selflessly, we would not be able to provide the care you have come to expect from your local hospital. 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
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#### **MORE NEW PROCEDURES RIGHT HERE IN LEWISTOWN**

At the heart of a community hospital's service is a basic need. That is, to bring the highest-quality medicine within easy reach.



Lewistown Hospital supports this local strength in many ways. We provide excellent emergency and intensive care. Our Telestroke program quickly connects neurologists at distant facilities with stroke patients here. Outstanding cancer and cardiovascular care is offered. The Hospital is well known for the strength of its imaging and lab services, and many other important procedures and services are available without leaving town. (Yet

another new example is described in this issue. See the story about eICU on page 4.)

The development of superb medicine in Lewistown continues. In recent months, important steps have been taken. The result: numerous new surgeries and procedures are now done here. Others are expected to be available here soon.

#### SINUS SURGERIES

Carlos Recalde, MD, is a specialist in ear, nose and throat surgery. He is bringing several new procedures to Lewistown. "We have so many excellent techniques now," he said. "We can take care of the majority of sinus problems. People who have these procedures get an almost immediate benefit. If we do them on a Friday, the weekend takes up much of their recovery. They can be back at work in four or five days. And the discomfort is really minimal."

Dr. Recalde is especially enthusiastic about the new Navigator system. This enables surgeons to work on sinuses with pinpoint accuracy. "Sinuses can be very narrow," he said. "This works almost like GPS in a car. We might be removing polyps in the nose, for instance. The surgeon places the instrument in the nasal cavity, and he knows exactly where he's operating. It's very helpful in avoiding structures in the surrounding areas. Really, it's state of the art for this type of surgery."

Another effective procedure introduced in recent years is balloon sinuplasty. This technology uses a small, flexible sinus balloon catheter. It opens blocked sinus passages, restoring normal drainage. First the sinus balloon is emplaced. Then it is inflated. It gently restructures and widens the walls of the passageway. And it does not damage the sinus lining. "The beauty of this," Dr. Recalde said, "is that it can mean you don't have to do extensive surgery."

The doctor also described advances in ancillary sinus surgery. These procedures provide help to improve breathing. "Where there are problems with a deviated septum," he said, "they can be corrected at the same time."

#### **UROLOGY**

A new urologist has joined the Lewistown Hospital staff. Charles Zaleski Jr., MD, is board certified and has been practicing for more than 23 years. Dr. Zaleski will make a number of procedures regularly available to the people of the region:

- Transurethral resection of the prostate (TURP)—A procedure to remove part of an enlarged prostate gland.
- Ureteroscopy—the use of a special scope device to view and sometimes remove kidney stones in the ureters. It can be used with laser lithotripsy. A new machine at Lewistown enables this procedure. The process concentrates laser light to shatter the stones in place. Then they can be more easily removed.
- Cystoscopy—a diagnostic technique used to view the inside of the bladder and urethra. Cystoscopes can also be used in treating some urinary problems.

- TVT sling procedure—a treatment for stress urinary incontinence in women. TVT stands for tension-free transvaginal tape. It supports the bladder neck and urethra with a mesh-like tape.
- Many other procedures, including vasectomies, prostate biopsies, and penile and scrotal surgeries.

#### **ORTHOPEDIC SURGERY**

Two experienced Lewistown Hospital orthopedic surgeons, Dennis Devita, MD, and Harry Dinsmore, MD, have joined University Orthopedics Center (UOC). The addition of Drs. Devita and Dinsmore brings the total of orthopedic surgeons employed by UOC to fifteen. In April, UOC opened its new office location in Lewistown at 310 Electric Avenue, Suite 240, at the Electric Avenue Medical Center adjacent to Lewistown Hospital.

Plans are currently underway for UOC's two spine surgeons, Gregory Bailey, DO, and Joel Torretti, MD, to begin offering orthopedic spine services in Lewistown later this summer.

Lewistown Hospital is committed to building comprehensive orthopedic care in the Lewistown area. Through the Hospital's efforts in forging a strong alliance with UOC, the residents of Mifflin County can seek the highest-quality orthopedic care right in their own community.


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# elCU:

### New telemedicine to bring even better care to the community

It's a reality of today's medicine: what community hospitals need in order to provide excellent care may come from outside the community. It happens through telemedicine. Electronic links enable remote doctors to take part in examination, diagnosis and treatment.

Telemedicine is no longer the future of community medical care. Instead, it's the present. Lewistown Hospital has proved it before. The Telestroke program is an example. For more than a year, Telestroke has connected our doctors with neurologists off-site. Fast help from specialists serves patients when seconds count.

Now another telemedicine program is underway. It's called eICU, Electronic Intensive Care Unit. It's in place across the country at approximately 200 hospitals in 28 states. Some 300,000 patients

are monitored annually. Ten percent of adult patients have been involved.

Like Telestroke, it focuses specialist skills on the patient. That's true even when the specialist is miles away. And it's another transforming step in community medicine.

#### **Distance resources for intensive care**

An ICU specialist is an intensivist. These doctors see only critically ill patients. Many hospitals lack staff members in this specialty. Larger hospitals that have them can share their staffers.

The arrangement benefits both hospitals. It requires devoted time from the intensivist. Also needed is the technology to make it happen.

Lewistown has signed on for eICU through Geisinger. (The arrangement relies on the VISICU eICU Program from Philips.)

The basic technology includes a live two-way TV link. This allows the intensivist to see the patient. It's also possible to converse directly with the patient and bedside doctors and nurses. All monitoring happens in both locations. The care is documented in both places, too.

Care is fully coordinated. Intensivists are on duty from 7 p.m. to 7 a.m. daily. (They're available as needed around the clock.) During their shifts, they sit with critical care nurses in a remote viewing "hub." From

there, they take part in many aspects of care. They actively consult with attending physicians. Equipment settings, medication, and procedures – the intensivists offer their skills wherever required.

"The intensivist has a lot to offer," said Chris Mathews, Lewistown Hospital's Vice President of Nursing Services. "So does the rest of the staff. One might ask, 'Did you see this?' An intensivist in this arrangement can actively guide the care."

Geisinger's eICU staff has 13 members, including are critical care nurses and doctors, and unit support personnel. The group complements Lewistown's ICU staff.

#### A proven, effective technique

"This is great for the people Lewistown Hospital serves," Mathews said. "If possible, we prefer to keep medically complicated patients here. These are people with overlapping problems. One issue affects another. You can have cascades of medical problems. "It's better for patients and their families if they can get the complex care they need close to home."

"It's better for families that way, too. Their loved ones are right here.

"The new program means patients get attention from ICU specialists," Mathews continued. "Some rural patients couldn't easily find that kind of care. Often patients can be stabilized faster. Also, this kind of help can mean that intensive care stays are shorter. That's important for several reasons."

It's good in its own right, she explains. It shortens recovery time. Specialist consulting supports this. But there's more to the story. ICUs tend to be bright, noisy places. It can be hard to rest there. Also, the worst infections in any hospital are in the ICU. That's where the sickest patients stay, often with hard-to-treat infections. If exposure is shorter, the chance of infection drops. (Lewistown Hospital has posted very low ICU infection rates.)

The flexibility of eICU improves scheduling, and the ability to keep patients close to home, mentioned above, makes a real difference. "We've looked at this in our Patient Satisfaction Advisory meetings," Mathews said. "People are tremendously excited about this. There's no question it's better to keep families' loved ones here."

eICU also helps control costs. ICU care is among the most expensive a hospital provides. When patients can improve sooner and leave the unit, costs are reduced.

That's significant. But quality of care counts most of all.

"Using eICU has been proven to reduce deaths," Mathews said. "A year's data from Geisinger proves that. It also shows that the program cuts a full day off the length of stay in the ICU." With such positive results, eICU is another exciting example of the ways that technology and creative approaches can make our Hospital work better.

# The Lighter Side of Volunteering

One rule about volunteer work is always wise to follow. Here it is: *Make it fun*.

Janie Welshans, star volunteer, gets this. Janie's a mainstay of local charitable work. She does a lot of organizing. And she never forgets that things go best when participants enjoy it all.

Janie is Lewistown Hospital's supervisor of environmental services. She manages the housekeeping and linens departments. She's responsible for the main hospital and satellite locations. Forty-seven people work for her. In 27 years on the job, she says with a smile, she's "seen those buildings come and go."

She's given a big off-hours time commitment to the Hospital, and like many other givers, she works for other good causes as well.

#### Service with a smile

Volunteer work is seriously important to Lewistown Hospital. But that doesn't mean anything about it has to be glum.

You'll find Janie upbeat on most subjects. But she's seldom more "up" than when she talks about volunteering.

"You have to make it fun," she said. "So let's say we want to get women involved in an event. How about Bag Bingo? We offered these Vera Bradley purses and 31 other products. And the event was very popular! We sold out of tickets. It pulled in women from all over the area."

"Or let's say we're having a basket sale. We pick a theme. Then maybe we take it a little over the top. If it's chocolate, we put together a basket three feet high and three feet across. If it's games, we fill a kid's red wagon up with a hundred of them."

Getting people's attention is a specialty of Janie's. She's been doing it as a member of the Hospital Friends' board for more than three years. She's worked hard to help grow the Friends Legacy Endowment Fund. And her record includes all sorts of successful volunteer gambits.

She's worked on the Hospital's holiday market. ("That's a great one for the employees here," she said. "People love to shop while they work.") She's taken a hand in cookbook sales. She's sat on many management committees.

"It's all about where you can make the next dollar," Janie says. "So you're constantly brainstorming. To me it's a real pleasure to help with the fund-raisers and with decision making."

#### Keeping it in the family, taking it to the community

Janie's husband, Larry, shares her involvement. "I try to drag him along on everything I do," she said.

Local fans will recognize Larry as one half of the bartending team that hosts the Larry and Barry Happy Hour radio promotion Tuesday evenings at J. P. Edward's in Burnham. Those who take part in volunteer work will remember him from the community's Kid Connection, former Community Days, and his work on in-hospital memorabilia displays. "Mainly I support everything Janie does," he said. "I work on her coattails."

With Larry backing her up, Janie has also reached out with service in a variety of charities in the larger community. For 10 years she's chaired the Hospital's team for United Way Day of Caring. This event sends teams across Mifflin County. They identify needs and meet them. It's anything from painting a playground shelter to laying a tile floor in a library. Other examples of her community efforts are the About Kids program for the Mifflin County Kiwanis and the Pancake Festival affiliated with the local Christmas parade.

Janie's especially proud of her work with Habitat for Humanity. It's not just that she loves the hammer-swinging, hands-on aspect of homebuilding. What's even more gratifying is seeing the effect it has on deserving families. "It's so cool to hand over a key," she said. "I just love it."

"I don't really think about this as volunteering," Janie said. "It's just sort of what I do. And you know, sometimes it isn't that hard."



- In Snyder County: West Beaver, McClure, Spring, Adams, Beavertown, Beaver and West Perry.

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

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#### New neighbors...old friends

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University Orthopedics Center and affiliated companies provide diagnostic surgical and rehabilitation services for patients with musculo-skeletal injuries or chronic/degenerative orthopedic disorders.

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### In with the New at The Family Place

New beginnings are an everyday thing at The Family Place in Lewistown Hospital. Now our maternity unit delivers a range of choices in birth plans. The same is true of the precious hours after a new arrival.

Patient Care Director Stacey Osborne is pleased. "We're offering more family-centered care," she said. "We're focused on patient satisfaction. Many more birth plan options are available to families. Patients wanted this. We had to push ourselves, but it was the right thing to do. We've made changes in policy and practice, and our obstetricians and pediatricians were very much on board."

#### Responding to changes

The Family Place hasn't changed physically in recent years. Still, the differences in how things are done are clear. One example is the current emphasis on early bonding. Especially as cesarean sections have become more frequent, this has been a challenge.

"Mothers and babies need to stay together after birth," Osborne said. "We encourage breastfeeding within the first hour. It used be that mother and child might be apart for observation that lasted several hours. Now we do that while they're together." Skin-to-skin contact is also encouraged between mothers and infants.

"As always, we welcome a support person through the whole process. We've changed our visitation policy so now there's a place for anyone the patient chooses," Osborne said. "The non-traditional is now traditional. Society is changing. We had to change, too."

Every aspect of the birth process and the time afterward is addressed at The Family Place. Mothers have always been encouraged to nurse their babies. Now enhanced breastfeeding services are offered. A lactation consultant is available as well as two breastfeeding counselors and two breastfeeding consultants. They provide help and guidance before and after discharge from the unit. Mothers can enroll in our Breastfeeding Basics class. (Information for nursing mothers is available on our Facebook page. Search The Family Place at Lewistown Hospital.)

Just as important to expectant mothers and couples are prepared childbirth classes. Funds from last year's Hospital golf tournament support this program. The childbirth classes are provided at no charge for patients planning to deliver at Lewistown Hospital.

The Family Place also has four car seat technicians. Their work covers not just infant seats but all types of child restraint. Also provided are free child seat safety inspections held monthly at the Hospital and by appointment.



#### Classes supporting informed care and family involvement Among the other classes offered:

- **Sibling Class**. Letting new brothers and sisters know what to expect is helpful. It promotes harmony in the family. Children's anxieties are eased, and they may deal more comfortably with the changes coming to their households. Children between ages 2 and 10 are welcome.
- Cesarean Class. This class helps prepare moms and couples for Caesarean delivery. It explains when a cesarean may be called for. It also covers many aspects of the operation and recovery, and describes characteristics of newborns delivered this way.
- Safe Sitter Class. This program provides medical information to boys and girls ages 11 to 13. It helps them develop safe babysitting skills. It also teaches them how to deal with emergencies.
- Breastfeeding Basics. This reviews the advantages and challenges of breastfeeding.

Also offered at The Family Place are bereavement services.

The next major initiative for The Family Place involves a new view of care. In the past, moms and babies each had their own nurse. A new approach is Mother/Baby Care where the same nurse cares for mom and baby. This provides for the pair together. The same nurses, for instance, see them both. The result is better care. It's being developed at Lewistown Hospital right now.

"The changes we are making are all about meeting the expectations of the parents," Osborne said. "It's all about what we do for families. It's all right here."
